

Whom Do We Love and Serve

"Never,' Peter says to Jesus. 'You shall never wash my feet."

In St. John's account of the Last Supper, in an act of Loving Service, Jesus tries to wash Peter's feet. But Peter will not have it. Washing another's feet was the duty of a slave, not a master. Here, Jesus, their Lord and Master, seeks to wash his disciples feet.

"Never," Peter says to Jesus. "You shall never wash my feet." Jesus reminds Peter that salvation depends upon trust in the Lord, saying, "At the moment you do not know what I am doing, but later you will understand."

Time and again Jesus, through his example, shows the disciples what His mission was all about. Jesus spelled out His ministry through His acts of loving service to others. Later, The Church came to call Him the "Servant Leader." But Jesus' immediate disciples didn't understand this.

When He fed the five thousand, with just a few loaves of bread and a couple of fish, the people wanted Jesus to be their king, but He refused, and they didn't understand. When He rode his rent-a-donkey into Jerusalem, the people welcomed Him as their king. But He didn't act like a king and they didn't understand. When He knelt down on the floor to wash his disciples' dusty feet; they didn't understand. They didn't want to see Jesus demean himself in such a way. And finally, on the Cross: the purest act of servant hood, the people failed to understand. And, some two thousand years later, we continue to struggle in our understanding; we find it hard to believe; we sometimes fight to accept it.

Jesus' life and ministry were misunderstood by His own people, not to mention his own family, because they expected God to send them a great king to set them free from their Roman rulers. They remembered the Golden Age of King David. How great it was to live as a free nation. How great it was to have armies; to have power!

Though David's reign was far from perfect, the people dreamed of a day when God would restore their past glory through another great military leader; a great King-Messiah! They had an obsessive, almost fanatical

belief in this image. And then Jesus came.

The important thing for us to understand is that God fulfills His purposes most effectively through humble servants, through those who are willing to serve others.

To be a disciple of Christ, in today's world of push and shove, we need to refashion the life-style we have been conditioned to live. Our world teaches us to look after ourselves. You are number one, it teaches. If you help another, make sure you take care of yourself first.

Jesus' view of discipleship, takes a fair amount of rethinking about what it means to be a disciple of the Living God. Many in our world are disciples of all sorts of gods; the god of money, the god of self, the god of summer, golf, beach, or mountains; and yes, the god of winter and snow skiing.

The gospel writers beg a couple of questions; Whom do you serve? Who will you serve? What master do you pattern your life after?

Your presence here on Sunday and Wednesday morning, proclaims the God you and I serve. We are telling the world as well as reminding ourselves that we worship and serve the Living God. We worship and follow the God who came to save his children through acts of loving service.

Jesus comes and kneels before us. He brings with him a washbasin and towel; he seeks to wash your feet. Pray that you accept our Lord's invitation to enter into a loving relationship with him. Pray that you accept our Lord's challenge to love others as he loves you. Amen.



This year, Tony Inscore and his crew gave out 98 pancake suppers to parish family and friends.









Saints Alive

William Law April 10

"If we are to follow Christ, it must be in our common way of spending every day. If we are to live unto God at any time or in any place, we are to live unto him in all times and in all places. If we are to use anything as the gift of God, we are to use everything as his gift." So wrote William Law in 1728 in A Serious Call to a Devout and Holy Life.

This quiet schoolmaster of Putney, England, could hardly be considered a revolutionary, yet his book had nearrevolutionary repercussions. His challenge to take Christian

living very seriously received more enthusiastic response than he could ever have imagined, especially in the lives of Henry Venn, George Whitefield, and John Wesley, all of whom he strongly influenced. More than any other man, William Law laid the foundation for the religious revival of the eighteenth century, the Evangelical Movement in England, and the Great Awakening in America.

Law came to typify the devout parson in the eyes of many. His life was characterized by simplicity, devotion, and works of charity. Because he was a Non-juror, who refused to swear allegiance to the House of Hanover, he was deprived of the usual means of making a living as a clergyman in the Church of England. He therefore worked as a tutor to the father of Edward Gibbon, the historian, from 1727 to 1737. He organized schools and homes for the poor. He stoutly defended the Sacraments and Scriptures against attacks of the Deists. He spoke out eloquently against the warfare of his day. His richly inspired sermons and writings have gained him a permanent place in Christian literature.
