



The Easter Dismissal

Easter is the day Christians celebrate the resurrection of Jesus the Christ from the dead. The early church saw Christ's resurrection as the central witness to a new act of God in history and the victory of God through Jesus as the Messiah. This event marks the central faith of the early church and was the focal point for Christian worship, observed on the first day of each week since the first Century. Easter as an annual celebration of the Resurrection lies at the center of a liturgical year that has been observed at least since the fourth century.

Easter occupies a central place as the high point of Christian worship. Easter, like Passover, is a movable feast. The date of Easter is not fixed but is determined by a system based on a lunar calendar. In this system, Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday following the first full moon after the Spring equinox. This usually occurs on March 21, which means the date of Easter can range between March 22 and April 25 depending on the lunar cycle. Easter Sunday and Ascension Day colors are white and gold, the colors of sacred days throughout the church year. For the Easter season, white symbolizes the hope of the resurrection. The gold symbolizes the light of the world brought by the risen Christ that enlightens the world.

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


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According to St. Matthew:
