Stop! Look! Listen! Written by Rev. Cecil H. Skibbe

THE CALL

In the early railroad decades of this century, it wasn't unusual for four different railroad companies to have trains, freight and passenger, passing through towns in the Midwest. Those big steam engines always got attention. It was exciting to watch them take on water and coal, build up steam, and then tug away with their long string of cars.

Each locomotive had its own distinct steam whistle sound. Whether working in the fields in the spring and summer, or cutting wood in the winter, people would always know the time of day as they learned to recognize the whistle sounds of the various trains. Out in the countryside where the train tracks and roads crossed, there would only be the familiar white railroad crossing sign. However, in town there were additional safety installations. One railroad company installed a clanging bell that would be set off by the approaching train. Of course, on each engine there was a highly polished bell as well as the familiar steam whistle that could be heard for miles away providing the wind was in the right direction. One of the crossings had a sign with the words: STOP! LOOK! LISTEN! At another multi-crossing, as a train was approaching, a man would emerge from a nearby booth with his familiar STOP sign by day and a lantern at night. He was simply referred to as the "Flag Man". Later, of course, electric flashing lights and automatic gates replaced the flag man and the silent signs and, eventually, the old steam engines were replaced by the diesels.

STOP! LOOK! LISTEN! This type of sign would never work today. People wouldn't see it, let alone read it and yet, it is good advice. It might be well for us to briefly consider those three words: STOP! LOOK! LISTEN! We must STOP to take inventory ... to see what great things God has done for us ... to make certain we have our priorities straight, lest we be going on the dead run ... STOP to make sure we are on the right track ... STOP for rest and contemplation ... STOP to consider possible dangers and pitfalls that may be lurking on our path ... STOP to gain spiritual rest for our soul... STOP to commune in prayer with our heavenly Father ... STOP to drink of the water that quenches all thirst. Not only must we STOP, we must also LOOK. We must LOOK ahead ... about us and within ourselves ... LOOK up to Jesus, the Author and Finisher of our faith ... LOOK to the Lord for guidance, strength, comfort, peace, companionship, hope, assurance, forgiveness and salvation.

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Heed the holy writer who says, "Let your eyes LOOK directly forward, and your gaze be straight before you. Take heed to the path of your feet, then all your ways will be sure" ... "LOOK to me" the holy Lord God declares, "and be saved". May the language of our hearts be, "As for me, I will LOOK to the Lord, I will wait for the God of my Salvation; my God will hear me". Micah 7:7.

STOP! LOOK! LISTEN! We must faithfully LISTEN to our heavenly Father who says to us, "This is My beloved Son, with Whom I am well pleased; LISTEN to Him". Matthew 17:5.

There are all kinds of voices out there in the world trying to get our attention. LISTEN to Him who created us, redeemed us and sanctified us. LISTEN to the holy, Spirit-filled, power-packed Word of our Lord. We must faithfully, diligently LISTEN for the purpose of discovering: What's the Lord Jesus telling me about Himself? ... about myself? ... What warning, admonition, instruction is there for us on the cross at Calvary; that He took our place, paid our price, that in Him we have eternal life. How important it is that we pause from time-to-time; that we take inventory of our lives; that we make certain that we know from where we have come, why we are here, and above all, that we know where we are going. To that end it is vitally important that we **STOP! LOOK! and LISTEN!**

All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name By Tim Challies

Edward Perronet was born in England in 1726, the grandson of a French immigrant. His father, Vincent, was a clergyman in the Church of England and a close friend and associate of John and Charles Wesley. Though Edward had planned to follow his father into Anglican ministry, the influence of the Wesleys prevailed, and he became a traveling Methodist preacher.



Louis Benson records in his Studies of Familiar Hymns, Second Series that Edward was a capable preacher and sincere follower of Christ. For some reason, however, he developed a strong antagonism towards the Church of England, and began to express it in his behavior and speech. This proved to be a source of trouble for the Wesleys. Edward eventually left the Methodist movement and settled down with a dissenting congregation, which he pastored until his death in 1792.

In addition to preaching, Edward was also a skilled writer; and in the latter years of his life he published anonymously, in a series of small books, a number of hymns he had composed. One of these books, Occasional Verses, Moral and Sacred, contains as its third entry the hymn titled "On the Resurrection," which is now known as, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name."

To the right are the original lyrics to the hymn, as first published in Occasional Verses. The hymn was originally sung to the tune "<u>Miles</u> <u>Lane</u>," written by a friend of Edward, William Shrubsole. Just a few years after its release Oliver Holden of Massachusets composed an alternate tune for it, "<u>Coronation</u>," which is the melody most familiar to us in North America.

All hail the power of Jesu's name! Let Angels prostrate fall; Bring forth the royal diadem, To crown Him Lord of All.

Let high-born Seraphs tune the lyre, And, as they tune it, fall Before His face who tunes their choir, And crown Him Lord of All.

Crown Him, ye morning stars of light, Who fix'd this floating ball; Now hail the strength of Israel's might, And crown Him Lord of All.

Crown him, ye martyrs of your God, Who from His altar call; Extol the stem of Jesse's rod, And crown Him Lord of All.

Ye seed of Israel's chosen race, Ye ransom'd of the fall, Hail Him who saves you by His grace, And crown Him Lord of All.

Hail Him, ye heirs of David's line, Whom David Lord did call; The God incarnate, man Divine; And crown Him Lord of All.

Sinners! whose love can ne'er forget The wormwood and the gall, Go—spread your trophies at His feet, And crown Him Lord of All.

Let every tribe, and every tongue, That bound creation's call, Now shout in universal song, The crowned Lord of All!

C.A.T. Survey Results

On Sunday August 6th, the Reverend Earnest Graham, Canon for Ministry at the Diocese of North Carolina, came to St Andrews to share the results of our Congregational Assessment Tool. The tool was completed by 109 members of the Congregation. Overall, 59% of our members indicated they are clearly satisfied with things in the church. In comparison to other churches this indicates a High level of Satisfaction. The survey indicated our top 3 priorities are:

- 1. Make necessary changes to attract families and youth to our church.
- 2. Develop and implement a comprehensive strategy to reach new people and incorporate them into the life of the church.
- 3. Provide more opportunities for Christian Education and spiritual formation at every age and stage of life.

The full survey results are available via email from the office. All the information in the report will be used to further inform potential Rector candidates as well as give our Church Leadership a roadmap for the future. Thanks to everyone for their input and support!

The Congregation Assessment Tool was recently administered in your church. 223 persons were invited to participate; of these, 109 persons responded. A response from every member is not required to provide valid results. For a complete readout, please review the Vital Signs report that was sent to your church. A summary of that report is provided below. Overall, approximately 59% of your members are clearly satisfied with things in the church. This, along with other information, indicates that the church has options which include growth, expansion, replication, and external impact. Whether any of these will be realized depends on the choices made.

Not every question is of equal importance to members. When asked how satisfied they are, members tend to focus on the issues addressed in the questions below. When they feel more positive in these areas, they tend to feel more positive overall.

- In important decisions in our church, adequate opportunity for consideration of different approaches is usually
- provided.
- Our former Rector helped us accomplish our mission by bringing out the best in everyone.
- The worship services at our church are exceptional in both quality and spiritual content.
- Our former Rector articulated a clear vision for our church and kept it before the people in a compelling way.
- Our former Rector made things happen.

Conversely, when your members feel less positive about the areas above, they tend to feel less satisfied with their experience in the church overall.

Every church exhibits patterns in its life that contain strengths and potential weaknesses. Your church has potential strengths related to relevance and religious experience. Potential weaknesses include a fear of authenticity and difficulty facing personal and corporate shortcomings. As members look to the future, their top four goals are

- Make necessary changes to attract families with children and youth to our church.
- Develop and implement a comprehensive strategy to reach new people and incorporate them into the life of the church.
- Provide more opportunities for Christian education and spiritual formation at every age and stage of life.
- Create more opportunities for people to form meaningful relationships (for example, small groups, nurtured friendships, shared meals, etc).

In comparison to other churches, three goals that are unusually strong for your church are

- Change or improve the music of the church to deepen our worship experience.
- Strengthen the pastoral response of the church in serving people serving people in times of need (emotional, mental, physical, spiritual, etc.).
- Make necessary changes to attract families with children and youth to our church.

These may warrant attention from the leadership even if they are mid-level priorities.

All the information in this report should be explored and validated in further conversation. Survey data is not the end of a conversation but the beginning.
