Love One Another Mark 12:28-34

One of the scribes came near and heard Jesus and the Saducees disputing with one another, and seeing that Jesus answered them well, he asked him, "Which commandment is the first of all?" Jesus answered, "The first is, 'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' The second is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these." Then the scribe said to him, "You are right, Teacher; you have truly said that 'he is one, and besides him there is no other'; and 'to love him with all the heart, and with all the understanding, and with all the strength,' and 'to love one's neighbor as oneself,' this is much more important than all whole burnt offerings and sacrifices." When Jesus saw that he answered wisely, he said to him, "You are not far from the kingdom of God." After that no one dared to ask him any question.

In this reading from Mark's gospel, a scribe asks Jesus which, among the six hundred plus commandments in the Jewish law, was first having priority over the others. And Jesus promptly points out and summarizes all these into two. He combines the first sentence of the Jewish Shema prayer from Deuteronomy 6:5: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your strength" with its complementary law from Leviticus 19:18: "You shall love your neighbor as vourself." Jesus first teaches us that the greatest of all commandments is to love God with our whole being because God is the foundation and source of love. As we are reminded in 1 John 4:19, "We love because God loved us first." It is only by loving God that we truly learn how to love. Immediately Jesus follows it up with loving your neighbor as yourself because once we put God at the center of our love, we learn how it is to genuinely do the same for our neighbors.

Loving one's neighbor is simply the natural and necessary extension of true, wholehearted love for God, because our neighbor is made in the image of God. To love our neighbor as we love ourselves means that we should care for others in the same way that we would care for ourselves. It means acting with compassion. We should be a companion to those who are lonely with the same eagerness that we seek companionship when we are lonely.

We should value the lives of others to the same degree as we long to be valued. We should feel the same urgency to relieve our neighbor's suffering that we feel to relieve our own. We should extend the same patience and forgiveness to our neighbor that we grant to ourselves. And we should pray for others with the same zeal and devotion that we pray for ourselves. To love our neighbors as ourselves is hard work. It takes intention, sacrifice, and courage. So today and for the rest of this Lenten journey, I invite you to practice love -practice loving yourself, your neighbor, and your God.

O God, you have taught us to keep all your commandments by loving you and our neighbor: Grant us the grace of your Holy Spirit, that we may be devoted to you with our whole heart, and united to one another with pure affection; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen. (BCP 231-22)

Christ the Lord Is Risen Today

The Lord is risen! He is risen indeed! Today Christians around the world are remembering the resurrection of our Savior. If you are celebrating Easter in an English-speaking church, there is a good probability that you have sung or will sing the hymn, "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today."



For about 300 years now, this hymn and its variants have been sung in English churches to commemorate and celebrate that Sunday morning about 2000 years ago when Jesus Christ walked out of his tomb, demonstrating that he had forever triumphed over sin and death for both himself and all his people.

The earliest forms of the hymn can be traced back to a Latin text from the 14th century. In 1708 the four Latin stanzas were translated into English and published by J. Walsh in *Lyra Davidica* under the title "Jesus Christ Is Risen Today." A few decades later, in 1739, a modified version was published by John and Charles Wesley (Charles is pictured above) in *Hymns and Sacred Poems* under the title "Hymn for Easter Day." It is this version, later shortened and supplemented with the "Alleluia" refrain, that has become the hymn that remains so popular today.





Easter Medical Debt Jubilee for the Rocky Mount Convocation of the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina

There's a story in the Gospel of Luke about Jesus visiting the synagogue in his hometown of Nazareth. When he's invited to read, he opens the scroll of Isaiah and reads the beginning of the 61st chapter:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set free those who are oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."



to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." (Isaiah 61:1-2, Luke 4:18-19)

The year of the Lord's favor is known in the Old Testament as the year of Jubilee—the end of a seven-year cycle in the Law of Moses given in Leviticus and Deuteronomy. In the year of Jubilee, the Lord said to the People of God, "you shall grant a remission of debts. And this is the manner of the remission: every creditor shall remit the claim that is held against a neighbor, not exacting it, because the Lord's remission has been proclaimed," (Deuteronomy 15:1-2).

Last year, the pastors and people of a small group of Wilson, NC churches raised the funds to abolish nearly \$5.7 Million of medical debt in Wilson County and Edgecombe County. This year, St. Timothy's Episcopal Church is partnering with other parishes in the Rocky Mount Convocation and the Diocese to remove the remaining \$4.5 Million of medical debt in the counties making up the Convocation: Wilson, Nash, Edgecombe, Warren, Halifax, and Northampton. We encourage all of our neighbors in these cities and counties to join our effort to provide a financial jubilee to our neighbors.

Our goal is to raise the \$17,767 necessary for RIP Medical Debt to purchase and abolish the \$4.5 Million of medical debt in these counties by the end of the Easter season on Pentecost Sunday. In the season that we especially remember Jesus' victory over the grave and our freedom in him from the debt of sin, we will help abolish crushing medical debt in these counties. We are grateful for the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina's commitment of a \$5,000 challenge grant toward this goal! If, by the grace of God and the generous hearts of you our neighbors, we exceed our goal, we will contribute toward relieving the enormous level of medical debt in Johnston County (over \$14 Million), where we hope another campaign will be getting underway soon with the same deadline in mind.

We invite all of our neighbors with the will and means to contribute generously to this campaign by clicking the donate button for our campaign on the RIP Medical Debt website. Alternatively, you can mail a check to St. Timothy's Episcopal Church with "RIP Medical Debt" written in the memo line (202 N. Goldsboro St. Wilson, NC 27893). Every Wednesday, we will wire funds that we have received to RIP Medical Debt and those sums will be added to our campaign display on the website.

St. Andrew's note: This is a very legitimate worthwhile project for the convocation to undertake. The majority of debt is from Nash County. We originally discussed this with Fr. Paul from Wilson who is heading it up but after evaluating it, we decided we needed to do something on our own to support the Hudgins family. We will be announcing plans for a fundraiser soon to address their needs. Our effort doesn't preclude the importance of relieving medical debt in Nash County. My hope is that as a parish we can participate in both efforts but wanted everyone to have a clear understanding of the situation. 
